TOWN & COUNTRY BOARD OF ALDERMEN MEETING



CHANGES TO AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE KEEPING MORE GRAND TREES OR COSTING DEVELOPERS MORE MONEY



Here is the first read to change the ordinance concerning Grand Trees:

- d. Replacement Requirements: Grand Trees that are removed due to disturbance that is necessary to permit construction, that are otherwise not dead, diseased, or a public hazard, shall require the installation of replacement trees equal to twenty-five (25%) of the total caliper inches of the Grand Trees that are removed.
 - (1) ~~In lieu of~~ **In addition to** the installation of replacement trees a contribution to the designated City of Town and Country Tree Fund shall be made in the amount of thirty dollars (\$30.00) per square inch of ~~twenty-five percent (25%)~~ **fifty percent (50%)** of the cross-sectional area of the Grand Tree(s) removed **up to an amount not to exceed one-hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000).** .
 - (2) Trees to be planted to meet requirements for new landscaping and bufferyards shall count as replacement trees.

This change came from the Planning and Zoning Commission where it passed on a 5-3 vote with Mayor Rehm, Commission Chair Cima and Dennis Bolazina voting against it. During this meeting Mayor Rehm stated after hearing more information he would vote for it. (However, as mayor he doesn't have a vote unless there is a tie)

This change would protect Grand Trees from developers by charging money to remove healthy trees at new development sites. The trees killed in Ward-2 at Rob "Tree Killer" Rehnquist was brought up.

There was also a public hearing on the change of the bill held at the start of the meeting. The two speakers, both from the Planning Commission spoke, Granville White and Fred "Hot Air-Full of Himself...tried not to pay city sales tax on a new car) Meyland-Smith spoke.



Granville White spoke first. Here are some of his remarks.

My wife and I have been residents of Town & Country for 37 years. We have welcomed the changes in the City in that time and the amenities that have enhanced our daily lives.

And we have also been blessed in the preservation and tasteful efforts that successive elected Leaders of the City have made in improving those amenities. Preservation of natural resources has always been a focus of City and Citizen groups. For example, a Town & Country Conservation Commission in 1996 identified all Natural Heritage Trees in the city, being trees over 3 feet in diameter. We hope the current city stewards take actions which support the continuance of those traditions.

In the City's 20-year Comprehensive Plan, there are two specific criteria referring to the current discussion:

1. "Maintain and Improve the natural resources ... of our community" and
2. "Tree canopy has aesthetic, economic, health and wildlife benefits..."

This zoning code amendment is one way to meet these goals. I believe it is up to City, as stewards, in selecting how to structure this zoning code taking into account:

1. That the determination should support the Comprehensive plan.
2. That we are the only advocates for these trees, many of which have been with us for generations.
3. I suggest we do **not** owe our primary allegiance to the self interests of outside developers.

I do not say self interests of developers in a pejorative sense – that’s their job; this Amendment gives them an **incentive to help in the preservation** of the natural resources of our City in a win-win situation. After all, it is highly likely that these natural resources are a factor in what attracts them to Town and Country in the first place.

Without a disincentive to destroy, developers may be more inclined to unimaginatively clear-cut sites leaving them treeless because it’s their least cost. Just look at the vast open spaces of Town & Country Crossing, Manchester Meadows and various residential sub-divisions. This amendment will encourage them think how site layouts might be modified to create attractive additions to the City.

It has been said that the fiscal contribution is a tax. It is not.
It is two things. **It is an incentive to developers to include existing grand trees into their plans.** And, if they chose not to, **it is a contribution to replace trees that they remove.**

It has also been said that a grand tree is another name for an old tree and that there should not be a penalty to remove an old tree. To which I say “how old?”
In Town & Country we have Grand trees from 50 years old to over 200 years. Yes, a percentage of them have reached an irreversible decline – and in any development these will be identified by a qualified Arborist and will not be protected by this code amendment. But those identified as vibrant have provided pleasure and wild life protection, not for the few months of a developer’s knowledge, or even years of residents’ knowledge, but for **generations upon generations past.**
And, with our wisdom, for generations and generations and to come.

Alarmists will also say that Grand trees belong in parks and open spaces, or that grand trees do not belong next to houses.
I hope you will agree that in Town & Country we should not clear cut large healthy trees back from all houses, roads and streets! We generally have one acre lots which, together with **our neighborhoods, are, in fact, enhanced by large canopy trees.**

Thank you. I leave you with three closing thoughts:

- Developers will favor their own interests before the best interests of the City.
- The proposed code amendment encourages developers to either incorporate grand trees into their plans or contribute to the City Tree Fund.
- Once a 100 year-old tree is chain-sawed down, **it is gone forever.**

Here are trees removed without city approval by developer Rob “Tree Killer” Rehnquist for subdivisions along Mason Road.



The great wind bag and city tax dodger (former alderman and appointed by Mayor Rehm to the Planning Commission) Fred Meyland-Smith spoke next.



Fred bought this SUV, kept it in Town and Country but registered it to a weekend cabin in Illinois to avoid local sales taxes.

Here are a few of Fred's remarks:

There are 5 underlying, supporting reasons to approve this Bill –

1. There is a thought that a grand tree is an asset to not just the property owner....but to the immediate neighborhood as well as the community at large. This asset requires 40 – 50 years to replace. (cite Missouri Conservationist magazine)
2. This provision should be viewed simply as a cost of doing business in the development plan. This is similar to the cost of earth moving/relocation or stormwater mitigation.
3. Funds derived from the grand tree protection are segregated and held separately in the City budget and should be used for tree planting, tree replacement, tree health maintenance in public space – our 3 parks, municipal buildings, Mason Road – Hwy 40 interchange.

Cite 3 examples where this measure could have applied –

Greystone – Ward 2. 5 trees removed - \$60K potential

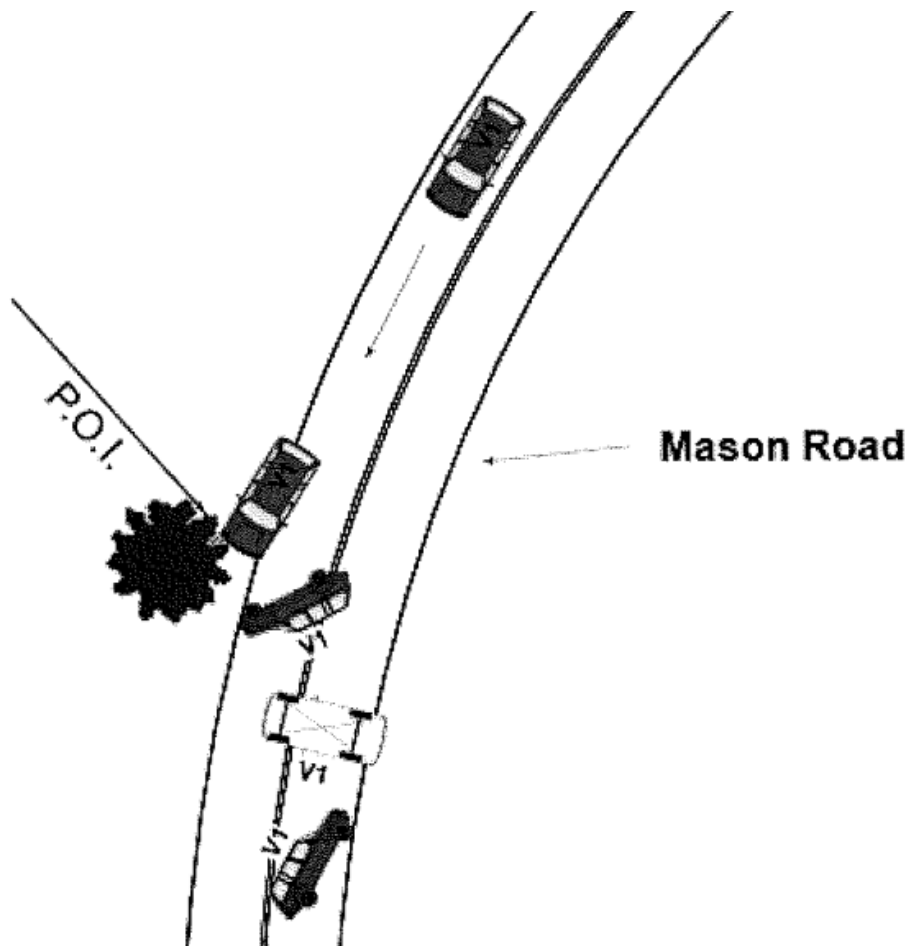
Stonechase – Ward 4. 38 trees removed - \$100K potential

Dubon Lane – Ward 1. 5 trees removed - \$42K potential

4. The fee structure is intentionally designed to be reasonable with a cap. This design element was included by the Planning & Zoning Committee on the recommendation of the City staff and our City attorney.
5. Keep in mind that this proposal applies only to new residential subdivision and commercial development. Typically this construction is financial or profit focused. This proposal tonight causes PAUSE and THOUGHT for COMMUNITY INTERESTS.

This is not an EXTREMEIST measure. It is a logical, sensible PROTECTIONIST proposal.

ANOTHER MASON ROAD CRASH August 12, 2023 12 noon Drunk Driver

This is from the Crash Report:

I arrived on scene and observed the vehicle overturned on the driver side blocking the north bound lane of Mason Road.

A wheel was imprinted in a tree off the west side of Mason Road, just north of the vehicle.

The driver explained the crash occurred when he was rounding the corner traveling north on Mason Road before Mason Heights Ct. The driver advised he was rounding the corner of the road too fast, and thought there may have been a deer crossing the road but was not completely sure.

The driver did not have any apparent injuries, and was assessed by EMS.

The vehicle was towed due to disabling damage.

TOWN AND COUNTRY OFFICER GOES HOME SICK AND TESTS POSITIVE FOR COVID: With two officers still out due to injuries from a car crash and a third being treated for COVID the Town and Country Police cannot really afford overtime for shift coverage if another officer goes out ill.

So the city paid ServPro \$500 to disinfect all 10 police cars, the locker room and squad room. The bill was \$200 for the cars and \$300 for the police station.

In 2020 with the outbreak of COVID pandemic most area police departments saw some officers come down and have to be on medical leave for treatment of COVID. With a new strain of COVID coming back this is not unexpected again. Don't be surprised to see masks back.

18XXX Chesterfield Airport Road- On 7/2/2023 the management of Comfort Inn advised an officer they wanted a guest removed from the premises. The guest was described as a female resident of Arizona, age 29. The guest had created a disturbance cursing and yelling at hotel staff. The guest had collected her belongings and was walking with the officer to her vehicle when she suddenly began cursing and yelling at the officer. The subject sat down on the curb, refusing to leave the premises. Subsequently, the officer informed the subject she was under arrest for trespassing. As the officer approached for handcuffing, the subject kicked him and spit on him. The officer was able to secure the subject, only to be spit on again as the subject was being placed in the police car. No injuries to either the officer or the subject. In custody Muni warrants were obtained for the charges of Trespassing, Assault on Police and Resisting Arrest. Bond was set at \$5,000.

CRIMINAL COMPLAINT

I, the Complainant in this case, state that the following is true to the best of my knowledge and belief.

On or about the date of July 9, 2020, in the county of Sebastian, in the Western District of Arkansas, the Defendant, Lexis Nichole Flores, violated:

Code Section

49 U.S.C. § 46504

Offense Description

Interference with Flight Crew and Attendants

SUMMARY

5. On July 9, 2020 at approximately 4:27 p.m., Fort Smith, Arkansas Police (FSPD) were dispatched to the Fort Smith Regional Airport. FSPD Officer Breedlove arrived at the airport and was approached by Richard Rushing, Director of Operation at the Fort Smith Regional Airport.

6. Director Rushing told Officer Breedlove that a female passenger communicated that she had a bomb. The aircraft's pilot radioed the airport tower and reported the situation. The front area of the Fort Smith Regional Airport was cleared of all personnel.

7. FSPD Officers and airport personnel evacuated the aircraft and searched for the suspect. FSPD Officers Breedlove, Adams, and Jones detained a female, who was later identified as Lexis Nichole Flores. FSPD Officers escorted Flores to the pat down room of the airport.


8. FSPD Detective Elliott advised Flores of her Miranda Rights, the rights warning was witnessed by FSPD Officer Marion. Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Special Agent (SA) Ryan Crump joined Detective Marion in the pat down room. Flores told Detective Elliott and SA Crump that she said she had a bomb so they would let her get off the airplane, but she did not actually possess a bomb.

9. A flight attendant, identified as P.D., told Detective Marion that Flores, who was seated in 13A, asked her if it was too late to get off of the plane. P.D. told Flores that it was too late, as the doors were closed. Flores threw up her hands and said, "I have a bomb." P.D. explained to Flores that having a bomb would result in her getting arrested, and then asked Flores if she really had a bomb. Flores said that she did not have a bomb. Flores insisted that P.D. ask the pilot to let her off of the flight. P.D. said that she could not open the doors. Flores threw her hands up and said she refused to wear a facemask [this incident occurred during the time of the coronavirus pandemic]. P.D. walked to the front of the aircraft and notified the Pilot of the incident. The Pilot decided to remove Flores from the aircraft. While waiting for law enforcement, Flores came to the front of the aircraft yelling and demanding to get off of the plane. P.D. asked Flores to have a seat and calm down. Flores said "no" and stepped closer to P.D. P.D. asked Flores to calm down while P.D. contacted the Pilot. Flores calmed down, thanked P.D., and sat down in seat 2A. The flight crew then evacuated the aircraft and Flores remained on the aircraft, at P.D.'s instruction, until FSPD arrived and detained her.

10. FSPD Officers interviewed passengers on the aircraft who were seated near Flores. These passengers are identified as P.A., T.P., M.H., T.S., and J.M. P.A., T.P., M.H., T.S., and J.M. all confirmed that Flores communicated she had a bomb to P.D. and walked to the front of the aircraft to confront P.D.

11. Based on his experience training and the facts detailed in this Affidavit, Affiant believes Flores knowingly and intentionally, by intimidation, interfered with the duties of P.D., an aircraft attendant, in a manner that lessened the ability of P.D. to perform her duties.

12. In light of the above information, Affiant believes there is probable cause to charge Lexis Nichole Flores with Interference with Flight Crew Members and Attendants in violation of Title 49, United States Code, Section 46504.

**LARCENY/
RESISTING
ARREST**

A male Chesterfield resident, age 38, was wanted for two counts of Felony Stealing that had occurred on 2/21/2023 and 2/23/2023 respectively. The known individual was observed driving by Chesterfield officers in Chesterfield on 6/20/2023, 7/12/2023 and 7/13/2023. Each time an attempt to stop the subject resulted in a Failure to Yield. These report numbers are 23-2340 and 23-2960. The subject was arrested by Maryland Heights PD on 7/15/2023. A C Squad officer interviewed the subject and conducted an in-custody warrant application with the St. Louis County Prosecuting Attorney's Office. Two counts of Felony Stealing and three counts of Felony Resisting Arrest by Flight Creating a Substantial Risk of Serious Physical Injury were issued. Bond was set at \$150,000.

AMPERING

Long Road Crossing – On 7/19/2023 a suspect was observed via surveillance cameras on the lot of Jim Butler Kia, wearing a mask and hoodie, attempting to break into vehicles. Officers responded and engaged in a foot pursuit with the suspect, who was apprehended. He was in possession of a Glock-style BB gun, screw drivers, and an iPhone USB charger. Damage was found to two Kia vehicles, consistent with an attempt to steal. The suspect was a juvenile (15) from St. Louis City and was processed and conveyed to St. Louis County Juvenile Intake. There he was screened as sufficient for detention. His girlfriend, also a juvenile (15), later responded looking for him. She was taken into custody and released to a parent at the police station.

UNLAWFUL USE OF A WEAPON

Black Birch Dr – On 7/19/2023 a female, suspecting her boyfriend was cheating on her, drove to his address on Black Birch to confront him. She found him intoxicated and they argued outside. She was in possession of a bag of his items, which also contained a handgun. She retrieved the gun and fired one shot into the air. After the argument she threw the bag to her boyfriend and began to leave. Officers arrived and confiscated the bag with the firearm from the boyfriend. He was uncooperative. The female, a 24-year-old Hazelwood resident was located and arrested. Charges are being reviewed by the Prosecuting Attorney.

FELONY THEFT

SEU officers investigated a theft that had just occurred from the Sunglass Hut at Premium Outlet. A vehicle description was broadcast and subsequently the vehicle was stopped on EB 64 with five occupants. Investigation determined that four of the five subjects had been involved in the theft and the sunglasses that were stolen (\$1,500.000) were recovered. Three of the four subjects gave confessions. Warrants applied for.

STOLEN VEHICLE/ FRAUD

SEU officers were called to investigate a fraud at Echo Park (a used-car lot) near Premium Outlet. Investigation determined that several subjects had either successfully or attempted to purchase vehicles using stolen pedigree and credit information. Officers found that three vehicles had been purchased this way from our location and that a fourth had been purchased fraudulently from a location in Hazelwood. Officers arrested one subject who gave pertinent information that helped to identify numerous subjects that are actively involved in this incident and several others. As of this report, all of the stolen vehicles have been recovered and several subjects are currently wanted. The DHS may get involved as well to assist with this investigation.

**FELONY
STEALING**

SEU officers were called to the NIKE store at Premium Outlet. It was reported that three subjects left the store with approximately \$1,000 in merchandise. Four days later, SEU officers were patrolling the parking lots at the Outlet Mall. They observed a subject walking in the lot with several items of clothing with the hangars still attached and no bags to carry the merchandise. Once he saw the officers, he ran to his vehicle and was able to leave the area despite officers attempting to stop him. It was determined that this subject was involved in the theft four days prior. A foot canvas found that the subject that had fled, had left an accomplice behind. That subject (a juvenile) was arrested by SEU. The juveniles' father assisted in identifying the subject that had failed to stop for officers. That subject is currently wanted. Warrants were obtained for the juvenile.

OF NOTE

The SROs provided approximately 450 additional hours of Parks coverage during July. SEU officers as well as SROs assisted with the annual 4th of July celebration held at CVAC. Two SEU officers augmented the Major Case Squad on two occasions for homicide investigations. PO Brewer became certified as a Lock-Up defensive tactics instructor.

CLARKSON VALLEY

On June 1, 2017 the department entered into a contractual agreement with the neighboring City of Clarkson Valley to provide comprehensive police services; 24-hour uniform patrols, traffic enforcement, response to calls for service, court and meeting security and community engagement programs.

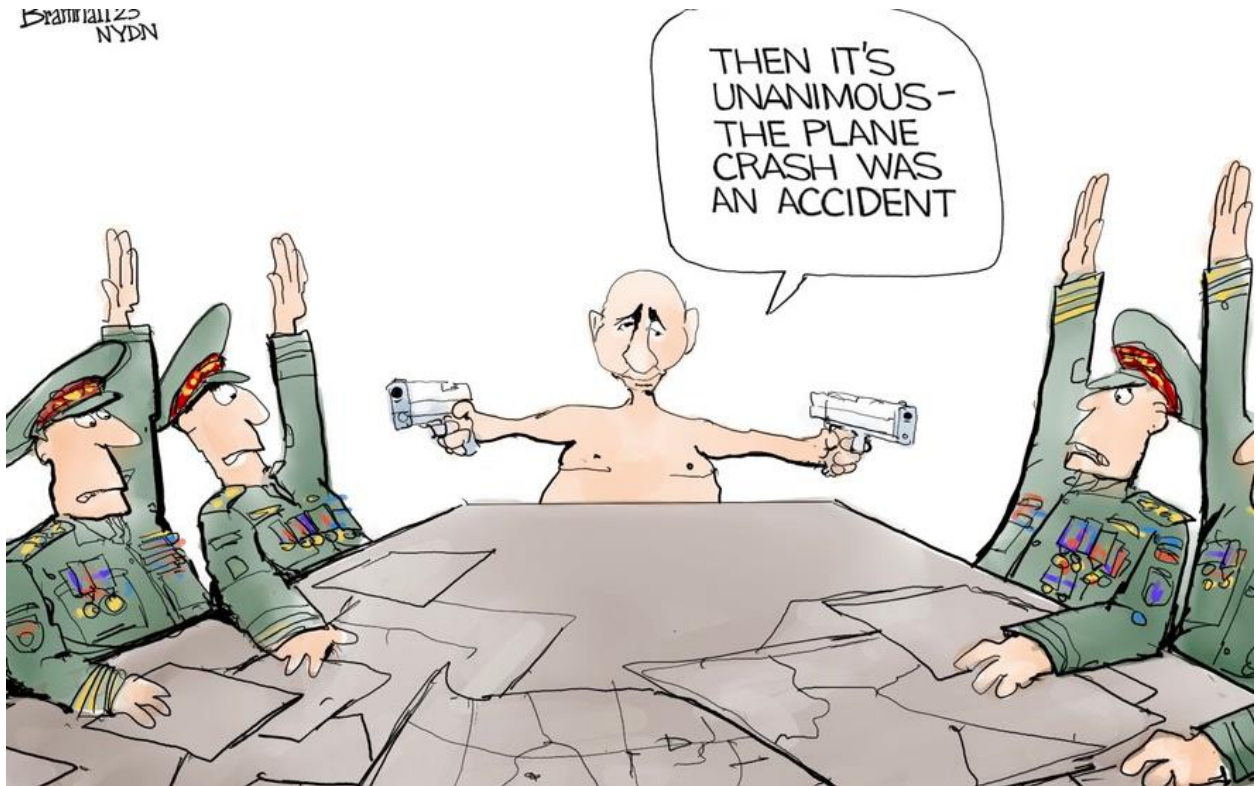

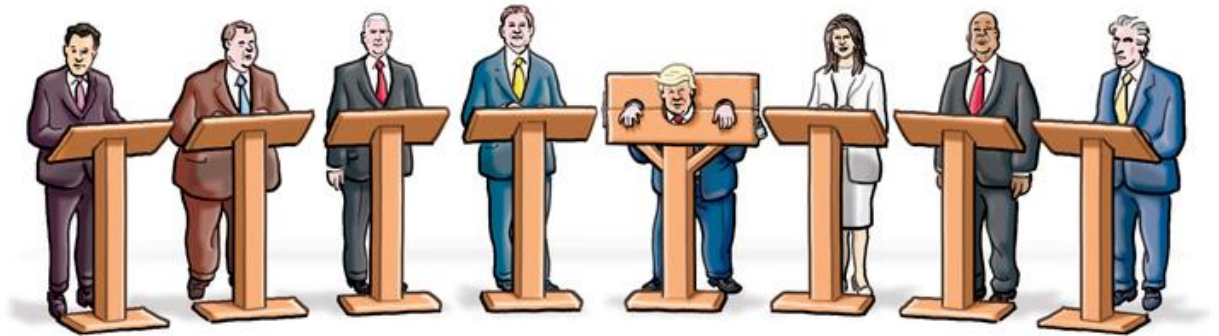
