SEVEN YEARS IN PRISON FOR DAYTIME BURGLAR WHO ASSAULTED

HOMEOWNER IN DRIVEWAY. It was March 9, 2021, at 4pm in the afternoon when a homeowner in the 12300 block of Clayton Road came home and found a gold Buick in her driveway. She then saw a black male wearing a mask, carrying a trash bag to the Buick.

At this point she was on her cellphone calling 9-1-1. She was standing by the side of her car when the burglar told her to put down the phone. When she did not, he said "Hang up lady, I have a gun" and walked up, knocked the phone out of her hand, then hit her with a closed fist knocking her to the ground causing her wallet to fall on the driveway. He then punched her three more times in the head.

The burglar then got into the Buick, drove across a neighbor's lawn and fled west on Clayton Road.

Town and Country Police broadcast a lookout for the suspect vehicle. Officers in Ladue saw the vehicle and gave chase, but disregarded the pursuit when the suspect was driving over 100 MPH on I-64 during rush hour.

While we have the victim's name and address we are not posting them for privacy reasons.

Police determined that the backdoor was forced open. \$16,237 worth of items and jewelry were stolen.

Detectives determined that earlier a package had been stolen (ring cam video) in the 13500 block of Clayton Road and a similar burglary was committed on Dry Ridge Road off of Clayton Rd.

Detectives tracked the get away car to a house on Labadie in North St. Louis City. The registered owner was Terri Jones.

Detective found the car on Labadie and as a tow truck was hooking up to the car for a tow back to T&C PD for processing, a woman came out of a nearby house and asked why they were towing her car.

Jones said she met the suspect only known to her as "Mickey G" when they both worked in food service at Missouri Baptist Hospital in Town & Country. He was a cook, but he was currently unemployed. She said he told her he had been addicted to Crack Cocaine and spent two years in prison.

She stated that on the day of the burglaries he had taken her Buick (properly licensed) leaving her with his newer Chevrolet with a temp paper license.

Police computer checks revealed the name "Mickey G" in St. Louis is associated with

Farland L. Gilliehan 57

A wanted for the arrest of Gilliehan and then an arrest warrant were entered into the police computer system for:

Robbery 1st Degree, Burglary & Stealing.

A blue surgical mask was found wrapped in a towel under the front seat of the Buick. Jones said it was not hers.


It was also determined the Gilliehan was wanted in St. Charles County for similar crimes. There was an address in Jennings that was also associated with Gilliehan.

Detective found that Gilliehan had sold jewelry at the St. Louis Gold Buyer and Jewelry store on two different days for \$100 and \$150. According to the police report over \$8,300 in jewelry was stolen and Gilliehan got \$250.

Gilliehan's girlfriend gave up his cell number and a check of the phone's location on March 9 showed both Clayton Road address and the Dry Ridge address.

On April 20, 2021 a County Police Detective assigned to a Federal Marshall Unit had arrested Gilliehan on the outstanding warrants. (Ellisville PD, Ladue PD and the County PD also had burglary cases against Gilliehan.) At the time of his arrest Gilliehan's only statement was, "I didn't beat up that old lady."

When detectives went to the County Jail to interview Gilliehan he declined to be interviewed, but stated he was not a violent person and did not have a gun when committing the crimes.

The owner of the property appealed the County tax appraisal of the property at \$14,500,000. They won the appeal and the property is now appraised AS OF August 4 at \$12,000,000, while the city is buying it for \$17,300,000.

Now tax appraisals aren't necessarily the true value of a property...regardless this one keeps dropping in value.

CITY COUNCIL



IT WAS THE 6-TO-2 NIGHT AT THE CITY COUNCIL MEETING. Every vote was 6-2 with Barb McGuinness and Pat Tocco on the “two” side and everyone else on the “six” side. But let’s see what the people were saying first.



We learned that a petition with over 100 signatures against the purchase was submitted to the City Council. AT the meeting on August 4th there were only two people out of 18 speakers who were for the purchase. At the August 18 meeting that changed. By my count the comments were 12-12 for and against.

Here are some of the pro comments:

“I’m very supportive of the purchase.”

“Having control over this building is a no brainer. Space for more parking spaces for community events is a no brainer.”

"I think this building makes sense," said Fred Steinbach, Chesterfield's first Mayor.
"I believe this will create revue for the city."

"I find this proposal to be outstanding"

"This building will pay for itself. Solve problems. Buy the building"

"Call the building an asset."

"I support what you are trying to do."

Here are some of the comments against purchasing the building and parking garage.

Recent former mayor Bob Nation: "The City has no business owning a commercial building. Sometimes Mike Geisel (city administrator) is so convincing despite much of what he says is false."

While Mayor Dan Hurt allowed some people to speak over the 4-minute max for comments, he shut down former mayor Nation right at the 4-minute mark. Nation asked for a few more seconds to finish, which were denied. "It's unfortunate that a former mayor can't speak a little longer." Were Mayor Nation's final words.

"We bought ground for parking and turned it into green space. This is not a comprehensive plan."

"This is not the purpose of municipal government. It's much more a risk than municipalities are used to. I'm 100% opposed."

"I have heard of no supporters of this. How can \$17.3-million be better spent? Why don't you let the voters just vote on it? Because you know it wouldn't pass. Citizens don't want the risk. Citizens don't want to be put into the commercial development business."

"Would this be in the best interests of citizens? We don't believe the purchase of the Mass Mutual Building would be in the best interests of the citizens."

"I filed a Sunshine (open records) request for the report with details of this purchase. The city clerk told me I could not receive an answer until August 20. Two days after this meeting and the vote."

“On this issue, I’m opposed. The amount of money, \$17.3-m is crazy. Who is going to pay for the aquatic center upgrade (\$20-m)?”

“This proposal runs against who we are. Show our voices truly matter. Vote NO! Protect tax money and the confidence of the citizens.”

“I’m opposed to the purchase of this building. The Park reserve fund should not be used to purchase commercial property. Citizens will not benefit from this, only lawyers when lawsuits are filed.”

“What I’m afraid of is that I keep hearing how you want of do this.”

TAKE IT TO THE VOTERS...COUNCIL VOTES NO! Councilwoman Barb McGuinness made a motion to put this on the April ballot and let the voters decide. Pat Tocco seconded the motion. It was defeated 6-2...so much for keeping the residents in the mix.

Prior to the vote Councilwoman Lane Koch stated, “The police need more space,” as a reason to buy the building. As we wrote last week, as a former police chief and someone who went to police agencies across the U.S and Europe as a reporter/columnist for a major police magazine...this building is a terrible place for a police substation. Koch then mentioned the building is “100% leased.”

Pat Tocco gave her opinion of this bill, taking several minutes to cover all the points.

I still see no justification for purchasing this building. And based on data provided and responses to questions asked, this city should not own commercial real estate. Let’s recap the values. The first appraisal for \$18.9 million was just wrong as it was quickly adjusted downward to \$17.6 million. The latest indication of value is at \$11.5 million which is the amount the owner used in their assessment appeal to St Louis County. That is the range with \$14.5 million in the middle. The question is, just looking at value, what could the city turnaround and sell the building for after it becomes the owner, not \$17.3 million that’s for sure, and not even for a Class A asset.

The valuation of an office building should not be viewed differently for a tax-exempt vs a taxable entity as virtually all commercial real estate owners are taxable entities and their current assessment of value should be the most accurate. This helps explain the wide range in appraised values and why this is a bad deal at \$17.3 million. The building was

never listed for sale. The city is and has been the only interested buyer. This is not a true arms-length negotiated deal at market value. Who would overpay for their personal residence and knowingly lose money on it the day after the purchase. That is...Unless you are making the purchase with someone else's money which is what is happening here.

I would also like to revisit two comments I made at the last meeting.

Regarding the belief that the city is entitled to a real estate tax exemption, Missouri Revised Statutes for Certain property exempt from taxes and the related case law states-

The exemption applies to all real property occupied exclusively for tax exempt purposes and not held for private investment or profit, even if the income or rentals received therefrom is used wholly for tax exempt purposes. Where part of a building is owned by a tax-exempt entity, only the portion used exclusively for public purposes would be exempt from property tax.

We have already confirmed this is how the St Louis County assessor applies the law. And confirmed with one city this is what they do to comply with the law. Thus, a city is obligated to pay real estate taxes based on the percent of non-public use of the office space.

This is how it is supposed to be. However, there are other state statutes that allow cities to avoid paying property taxes, such as using no bonus values to determine taxability or create an Industrial /Development Project which provides for a tax abatement. But as I said before, in all these cases, cities are using laws to take revenues away from other taxing districts and deciding on who gets the benefit. In this case, the city plans to keep it.

Regarding the parking issue and numbers provided, there is no support for 500 parking spaces purportedly needed, but it does correspond with the 422 spaces that come with the property. However, the 142 spaces on the surface lots are already being used during events, only the garage with 280 spaces is blocked off. And I explained why last time and yes it has to do with trash. Residents have asked for a current parking study to be performed and a review of parking options before a decision is made, both have been refused.

Final comments-

I would like to close with two additional topics. First, I am aware that 4 Sunshine law violation complaints have recently been submitted to the Attorney General's office on recent matters. Tonight I am announcing that I have filed a sunshine law violation complaint, with Barb McGuinness's input and agreement, that violations have been committed by city officials since this building purchase transaction has been resurrected

after the April election and up to August. I have previously discussed and provided a draft of my complaint with the director who provided a preliminary opinion. It is now officially filed and will need to be formally addressed by the city in a response. And, I expect an investigation will take place to confirm our allegations. We really had no other option. We believe this matter should be taken seriously and truly hope that the outcome will bring about positive permanent change in how this city operates.

And second. On last Friday the State Auditor issued its Report on the Investigation of the City's handling of the TIF. I recommend everyone read the report and take note of its findings and conclusions. Here is one that needs mentioning. Only about 35% of the 216-acre development area contains blight conditions which is acceptable under state law only because there is no clear criteria in the law. So how low can it be and still qualify? The report acknowledges that TIF state laws are vague and deficient, and thus difficult to apply to current projects such as ours. This is why the report asks the city to clearly identify which areas are designated as blighted, conservation, or economic development areas and for other important information needed to draw definitive conclusions.

The report mentions several issues that need to be addressed and identifies the need for more transparency in the plan. Why does lack of transparency continue to be mentioned as an issue? The answer is because it is an ongoing issue.

Everything I have said is relevant to the vote tonight because it is evidence of the extent of secrecy and lack of transparency used by this city in conducting business and making decisions, and thus reflects negatively on the justifications given to support this building purchase. The majority of the citizens see it.

I was elected by the ward 2 residents and that is who I work for. And I will represent them and do what I committed to do, oppose wasteful spending and bad business decisions.

Given the seriousness of all these matters raised tonight, and the need for them to be addressed before further consideration of the pending main motion, I am making a motion to postpone indefinitely this proposed transaction due to a significant premium being paid for no justifiable reason, not allowing citizens to vote on this, pending sunshine law complaint investigations, many misrepresentations made by city officials, many unanswered questions.

In addition to the above incidents, Chesterfield Officers also responded to a variety of other radio assignments, which included calls for Accidental Injuries, Traffic Complaints, 911 calls, Building Check, Noise complaint, Citizen Contact, Suspicious Subject, Suspicious Vehicle, Check the Welfare, Sick Cases, and Alarms.

Officers also patrolled neighborhoods, parks, and the business districts while also conducting traffic enforcement

CHESTERFIELD MAN CHARGED BY GRAND JURY WITH SETTING AN ANIMAL ON FIRE

Ex-convict and Chesterfield resident Daniel Hardcastle 46 of Chesterfield has been charged in arrested warrant for Animal Abuse and being a Convicted Felon in Possession of a Firearm. This was originally covered by local TV newscasts. Below is the charging document.

The facts supporting this belief are as follows: On June 6, 2025 Defendant was at 164 Southdown Dr. Defendant was in the backyard of the residence and put a groundhog in a metal cage. Defendant walked over to the groundhog in the cage carrying a gas container and stated that he had the animals holy water. Defendant then proceeded to dump the gasoline onto the animal in the cage. Defendant then lit the animal on fire. The animal was moving erratically trying to get out while it was screaming. Defendant and his actions were recorded. Defendant then sent the video of his actions to another person who called the police. The video was sent from Defendant phone number. This is the same number that Defendant had talked with Officers on. Defendant was arrested and read Miranda. Defendant admitted he did kill the animal. Defendant stated that they are allowed to kill the animals. When Officers conducted a search of 164 Southdown Dr on July 16, 2025 they located a loaded Ruger 9mm on top of the nightstand by Defendant and his girlfriend's bed. Inside of the closet connected to the bedroom was suspected narcotics, inside of the dresser were also suspected narcotics, and inside of her

makeup bag was also suspected narcotics. Defendant is a convicted Felon in case #2196R-05593A-01

I believe that the defendant will not appear in court in response to a criminal summons because he has an FTA Warrant already in case #2311-CR02618 Non-Support.

I believe that the defendant poses a danger to the community or to any other person because he is willing to torture/mutilate animals in the backyard. In addition Defendant has the following priors:


