**SECOND LOBBYIST AS AN ELECTED OFFICIAL IN TOWN AND COUNTRY!
THERE IS A DIFFERENCE, ONE WANTED TO KEEP CIGARETTE TAXES THE
LOWEST IN THE COUNTRY WHILE THE OTHER WANTS TO RAISE CIGARETTE
TAXES TO HELP FUND EDUCATION & HEALTH PROGRAMS FOR CHILDREN.**

What are the odds of a suburban affluent enclave would have two of the nine elected officials who were also lobbyists? Normally in most places you can't be an elected officials and a lobbyist.

Of course since long before he was elected an alderman and then mayor, Jon Dalton was a big time lobbyist in Jefferson City. For a decade he represented 28 different brands of cigarettes and helped keep the state tax on smokes the lowest in the country. While claiming to be looking after the health, safety and welfare of citizens with one hand, he was trying to kill them his other hand.



He has continued to have a wide assortment of lobbying clients over the years, many having a conflict of interest with a job as the head of a city. Some of his clients have included: red light and speed camera companies, other cities in St. Louis County, Town and Country's largest contractor, West County EMS & Fire Prevention District, casinos, the trucking industry, an area ambulance company and a taxi company.

On January 26, 2015 Town and Country Alderwoman Linda Rallo registered as a lobbyist in Jefferson City. The big difference is that Rallo has just one client, Raise Your Hand for Kids. This group is headed by Kansas City lawyer Erin Brower. It wants a raise in tobacco taxes to fund preschool health and education programs. Brower is a registered lobbyist for Raise Your hand for Kids and also Alliance for Childhood Education, also a Kansas City based organization.



Missouri Treasurer Clint Zweifel and Attorney General Chris Koster are pushing to raise the nation's lowest cigarette tax at 17-cents a pack to 90-cents a pack and use the money to fund college scholarships. Voters have to approve an increase in cigarette taxes and three prior measures have failed at the ballot box.

Rallo isn't a lobbyist in the traditional sense. She, like others who lobby for a company or charity they work for have to register as a lobbyist, but they are not schilling as a hired gun for any number of companies.

When I mentioned that it was nice talking to a lobbyist during a conversation with Linda, she exploded saying I shouldn't try make her look bad. She said that the work she is doing for trying to get funding for preschool health and education is the important work she is doing.

Three Hat Linda: It is interesting that Rallo is currently doing three things.

She is a Town and Country elected alderperson.

She works for Missouri Wonk, a company that researches Missouri legislative bills, taxes and other public policy issues for clients.



Missouri Wonk is run by Brian Schmidt, who is an actual lobbyist, but he doesn't mention it on the Missouri Wonk website. Among his recent and current clients have been a teachers group and Paul McKee's Northside Regeneration. McKee received millions in tax breaks to redevelop parts of North St. Louis, but in the last week was sued over lack of repayment of bank loans. Schmidt is also a lobbyist for Raise Your Hand for Kids.

Schmidt recently was the behind the scenes man for West County EMS and Fire Protection District tax increase election. Rallo is quick to point out that she is an independent contractor and doesn't work for West County EMS & FPD. However, when talk of Monarch with Jane Cunningham and Robin Harris controlling the board, possibly bidding for Town and Country Fire and EMS contract Linda last year would comment about all the trouble Monarch has with the fire union. Now she says she would need to study the issue and is worried about changing contractors.

In 32 years there has not been a competitive bid for fire service in Town and Country. All the fire districts that abut Town and Country have had firefighter union controlled boards that have declined to bid against another union controlled board at WCEMS&FPD.

Finally Linda is also a journalist who contributes to the Missouri Scout, a subscription daily newsletter that has "news, rumors and gossip." If you go to the Missouri Scout website you cannot find out who owns it or who is on the staff.

I have to think that possibly Linda filed this piece on her partner at Missouri Wonk the day after the April elections with the Missouri Scout.


MCDONALD'S DEMO AND NEW BUILDING IS POSTPONED FOR AT LEAST A YEAR: McDonald's had planned to tear down and rebuild the Town and Country restaurant this spring. Now it is not going to happen. Actually McDonald's got permission to do the rebuild in 2014 and put it off until the spring of 2015.

Now I'm told by someone at the McDonald's in the Lamp and Lantern Shopping Center the building will not be torn down and rebuilt until 2016, meaning the McDonald's Corporation will have to start the process of going before the P&Z Commission and Board of Alderman all over again. The reason for the delay is that McDonald's is coming out with new kitchen layouts, which won't be ready until 2016. The building is owned by McDonald's but the franchisee is Colleen Schoendienst.



TOWN AND COUNTRY SLEAZEBAG LAWYER DELAYS HIS FELONY CASE AND GETS HIGHWAY PATROL CASE DROPPED TO ILLEGAL PARKING:

Scott Ehlermann of the Laurel Lakes subdivision in Town and Country was charged with a felony of stealing documents from a court file involving a stalking/harassment and paternity cases. The theft from court files occurred on March 26, 2014. Ehlermann was charged on June 4, 2014 and then indicted by a grand jury on July 9, 2014.



Ehlermann has now continued that case to 15 months after the crime occurred and one year from when he was originally charged. The case now has a June 4, 2015 court date.

Criminal Court is not the only place where Ehlermann has been recently. He has been in Traffic Court too. On January 27, 2015 Ehlermann was cited by the Highway Patrol in St. Louis County for speeding 16-19 MPH over the speed limit.

Apparently St. Louis County Associated Circuit Judge Joseph Dueker has a hard time recognizing someone who clearly does not deserve a break today. He accepted a plea to a parking violation and fined Ehlermann a whole \$50.

Ehlermann is still filing lawsuits against his former wife, Karen, 11 years after their divorce.

If this wasn't enough there have been the lawsuits against Ehlermann by credit card companies and banks. To top that off he got hit with an \$1,807 tax lien by the State of Missouri in October of 2014 that he still has not paid.

PRINCIPIA FOOTBALL CAMP SODOMY CASES CONTINUED INTO SUMMER: It will be about time for the Principia Summer Football Camp when the four counts of felony sodomy or attempted sodomy charges against two former Principia students and football players are back in court. The two were charged after complaints were filed about hazing at the school's annual football camp for younger students. An investigation lead to the sodomy charges being filed.

Maverick Holmsley's cases have been continued to July 6, 2015 and Town and country resident Joshua Brewer cases are next set for court on June 26.

Ricardo Loma was charged with seven counts of misdemeanor assault in connection with the case. Loma pled guilty to those charges on January 26, 2015 and was sentenced to 10 days shock time in the County Jail and placed on two years probation.



ALDERWOMAN PRAISES DEVELOPER FOR FOR DESIRE OF CITY INPUT ON SCULPTURES. CAN THE UNDERFUNDED HORSE AND DOG BE HEADED WEST?

At the March 23 Board of Aldermen meeting Ald. Lynn Wright who also chairs the Park and Arts Commissions commented that despite missing the meeting she appreciated Town and Country Crossing developer Ramco-Gershenson wanting to work with the City Arts Commission on sculptures.

I immediately had to wonder with the Harry Weber sculpture of a horse and a dog that the Arts Commission is trying to raise private donations to cover the \$139,000 might be moving from the Mayor/Cigarette Lobbyist Jon Dalton's vision of a Town Center west to the corner of Clayton Road and Woods Mill. The hope of Wright was to have the sculpture in place next to the city's fire station at Clayton Road and Mason Road this year as part of the city's 65th anniversary of being formed as a village in 1950.

However at the time Wright made the remarks at the March meeting, only \$25,175 had been raised. That is just 18-percent of the money needed.

IF YOU NEED TO TELL EVERYONE THAT YOU DON'T HAVE A CONFLICT OF INTEREST, YOU PROBABLY DO: Cordell and Cordell, a national law firm that specializes in divorces and custody cases for MEN. The radio advertising includes narration of "It isn't the 1950's anymore. Men have rights too!" Cordell and Cordell are moving their National Headquarters from Creve Coeur to Town and Country in the Kellwood building on I-64 south Service Road at Maryville Drive.

The firm wants to put up a sign using the company logo and needed a variance. The sign would face eastbound I-64 traffic. This appeared to be no big deal, but Fred Meyland-Smith is on the Board of Aldermen and he has never met a sign he did not hate.

"I realize there have been many variances for similar signs in the area," said Meyland-Smith who then asked if the sign could be smaller. The sign expert with Warren Sign said the letters were as narrow as they could be and still have LED lights.





And of course our position is that if you have to ask someone if you have a conflict of interest, regardless of their answer, you probably do!


WESTMINSTER LIGHTS AND SOUND SYSTEM REQUEST IS FILED WITH THE CITY ON THURSDAY APRIL 16. The plans for a pavilion next to the tennis courts were submitted by Westminster Christian Academy to the city on Thursday April 16. Oh Yeah! They also presented plans for lights and speakers surrounding the football field that abuts subdivisions and a retirement and assisted living community.



At the top of the blueprints is Delmar Gardens assisted living and retirement facility. To the right are lots in the Arlington Oaks subdivision and to the bottom are lots in the Brook Mill subdivision.

There was opposition to lights in 2008 when the plan was withdrawn as the school was about to move to the former campus of West County Technical School in Town and Country. Westminster withdrew the request after it was voted down by the Planning and Zoning Commission.





I MISSED ANOTHER ELITE: Last week we ran nine reasons Westminster claims is affecting the school by not having a lighted football field. Reason Number 8 made me laugh. Here it is along with my response:

8) Creates an image of non-elite program in comparison to other schools.


(Country Day School does not have lights and plays football on Saturday. I don't know how much more elite you can get than Country Day Prep School in Ladue.)

What I forgot: First of all I forgot that John Burroughs School is considered to be just as an elite school as Country Day. They only play Saturday afternoon football games.

Finally while Country Day and John Burroughs are considered by many to be the top two "Elite" schools in St. Louis, each playing Saturday afternoon football games, Whitfield School is the most expensive private school in St. Louis. The tuition at Whitfield is currently \$23,700. This elite school has a full athletic program with one exception. They don't have a football program.



BACK TO THE FUTURE WESTMINSTER STYLE: I make plenty of typos and even an occasional spelling error when putting out this newsletter. However I'm not filing it for approval with the city. IRS FRAUD: It is interesting that the Chesterfield Police have taken more than 500 IRS fraudulent filing reports through April 15 representing 3-percent of the households in the city. meanwhile in Town and Country with a population of just 11,000 there were 65 cases in February and March. Our accountant is outside of Washington, DC and tells me IRS fraud cases are not nearly at this level on the east coast.

It is always good to see that St. Louis can still be leading the country in some things.

MONARCH APPOINTS A NEW ATTORNEY: On Thursday April 9 the two person board of Robin Harris and Jane Cunningham with Steve Sawyers missing, voted to appoint Matthew Hoffman as the new Fire District Attorney. Hoffman has been filling in for Mike Bakewell who had been on an extended medical leave. Harris said that Bakewell found it necessary to resign.

Chuck Billings replaced Bakewell when Kim Evans and Steven Swyers held the "pro-union" majority of the Board of Directors, with just Robin Harris representing the "pro taxpayer" element.

When the majority switched back to "pro-taxpayer" with the election of Jane Cunningham the attorney worked was bid out and Billings was fired as he was the high bidder over both Bakewell and Hoffman. Bakewell returned as the fire district's attorney.

Hoffman had been the Mehlville Fire Board attorney as that district went from a "pro-union" to a "pro-taxpayer" board majority.

DISMISSED LAWSUIT AGAINST MONARCH BOARD REVIVED AND OFF TO FEDERAL COURT: If you remember in recent weeks we looked at lawsuits and complaints to the human rights commission filed by member of Local 2665 of the Firefighter's Union.

When the Missouri Human Rights Commission would dismiss complaints against Jane Cunningham and Robin Harris commenting that no adverse action has occurred, the union's lawyer Rick Barry sued the Human Rights Commission in the Cole County Circuit Court in Jefferson City.

This costs taxpayers as Monarch had to defend the complaint and now since we are all taxpayers in the State of Missouri, we are paying for the defense of the Human Rights Commission.

In February the case of former Capt. Ray Antonacci resurfaced. Antonacci seriously injured himself in an off-duty motorcycle accident in 2009 that left him with a paralyzed leg. He used all of his sick leave, vacation time and even sick time donated by others. But by March 2011 or 18 months later he ran out of leave and still could not perform his job. He separated by the Fire District. But in early 2013 a new position of Education Officer was created by the Pro-Union board members of Steven Swyers and Kim Evans. Antonacci was hired back, but he was in a non-Union "at-will" job.



In April of 2013 Jane Cunningham was elected replacing Kim Evans and the board of directors became a "pro-taxpayer" and was no longer "pro-union." At the end of the year Antonacci was not fired, but his job was eliminated. This was not a surprise and during this time there was a receptionist job and a fire inspector job. Antonacci applied for both and was not hired.

He using the union lawyer who sued in 2014 claiming discrimination. A St. Louis County Circuit Court judge in November of 2014 dismissed the lawsuit claiming it was without merit.

New: Two months after having the case dismissed, lawyer Rick Barry asked for Leave to Amend the Petition and now claimed that Antonacci was discriminated against because his past association with the firefighter's union. Before the courts in St. Louis County could dismiss this new allegation, Berry moved the case to Federal Court. This means the taxpayers of the United States are now paying for court staff that have to deal with another Local 2665 lawsuit.

MOTION FOR LEAVE TO FILE FIRST AMENDED PETITION

COMES NOW Plaintiff, by and through counsel, and for his Motion to File First Amended Petition states as follows.

1. Plaintiff filed the present action on or about June 2, 2014.
2. Plaintiff desires to amend his Petition to add a Count alleging Defendants violated his constitutional right to freedom of association, in violation of 42 U.S.C. Section 1983.
3. This Motion is not made for purposes of vexation or delay.

WHEREFORE Plaintiff respectfully requests the Court grant his Motion for Leave to file his First Amended Petition, and for such further relief as this Court deems just and necessary under the facts and circumstances of this case.

You may have seen Antonacci's name in the news recently. A woman driving on I-70 in Wentzville was shot by a crazed passing motorist being pursued by police. Antonacci, who is the director of the Lincoln County Ambulance District just happened to be driving by, stopped and created an airway that possibly saved the woman's life.

Clearly Antonacci has used his training and experience and gotten a job. Since May of 2014 he has been the director of the ambulance district. Had he become a "receptionist" at Monarch headquarters, a job he claimed to be qualified for he might not have been able to save the shooting victim's life.

HOPE FOR THE BEST FOR FOUR NEW HIRES: At a March meeting of the Monarch Fire District four new hires were sworn in and joined the 126 employee fire district. Two of the new FF/paramedics are from nearby ambulance district and have already attended the County Fire Academy and are working at station houses. The two others were hired from the Cape Girardeau Fire Department and are attending the County Fire Academy.

The new firefighter/paramedics had their families there and there was cake after the swearing in. While watching this I was just hoping that these four will enjoy their new employment and not be corrupted by Local 2665 and filled with hate toward elected officials.



THE STRANGE CASE OF THE EMPTY FIFTH THIRD BANK: On Manchester Road in Des Peres across the street from the McDonalds, located in the Olympic Oaks Shopping Center is a new bank building, but no bank. Developers tore down the two-story building that housed Blockbuster Video rentals for decades to make room for the bank.

The Fifth Third Bank from Ohio built a fully functional bank, with a lobby area, multiply drive up lanes and plenty of parking for customers. But it never opened. Instead it is an empty building with a giant ATM. We only can hope that Henry Bemis (Burgess Meredith) is in a basement reading a book.



One area bank manager told me that Fifth Third never got permission from the FDIC to open the bank. Another local bank manager told me that the FDIC might have been unhappy with Fifth Third Bank not serving the entire community or had some violations pending. He also said that perhaps Fifth Third is waiting for the St. Louis economy to improve before opening the banks.

There is a similar Fifth Third Bank in Crestwood with a nice new building, but is only serving as a ATM. There are also two in St. Charles County that are just ATMS.

I did call fifth Third Bank's headquarters in Cincinnati. The firm's corporate communications director, Larry Magnesen sent me this response the next day:

There is limited information to share with respect to the Manchester Road and Crestwood facilities. There are a number of factors involved in opening a new branch, and we are working through them now.

MUSIC: The difference in a week.

Scott Stanifer from the east side, clarinetist Linda Gurney from Webster Groves and Chesterfield vocalist Joe Mancuso.
